Alquist Sesimic Safety Commission: seismic mitigation and earthquake early warning technology	The bill would, by January 1, 2025, and annually thereafter until January 1, 2030, require the commission to provide a report to the Assembly Committee on Emergency Management and the Senate Committee on Governmental Organization describing the commission's actions and conclusions pursuant to these provisions.

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5	AB 1786	Rodriguez	California Individual Assistance Act: California Local Assistance Act	This bill would add climate change and climate change exacerbated conditions to the list of conditions for which a state of emergency or local emergency may be proclaimed. his bill would additionally enact the California Local Assistance Act to establish a grant program to provide funds to local and tribal governments, transportation systems, and communities for specified costs related to a disaster, as prescribed. The bill would require the Strategic Growth Council to allocate moneys from the California Local Assistance Act Account, which the bill would establish as a special account within the Disaster Assistance Fund, for purposes of the program. The bill would authorize the Strategic Growth Council to adopt regulations, as determined to be necessary, to govern the administration of the program. The bill would require the Controller to transfer \$400,000,000 of the moneys in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund to the California Local Assistance Act Account for purposes of the act. By transferring moneys into a continuously appropriated fund, and by authorizing increased expenditure of moneys from a continuously appropriated fund for a new purpose, the bill would make an appropriation.

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6	AB 1858	Ward	Comprehensive school safety plans: active shooters: armed assailant drills.	This bill would additionally require, as part of the comprehensive school safety plan, if the plan includes procedures to prepare for active shooters or other armed assailants by conducting a drill, the development of specified procedures relating to that drill.
7	AB 1863	Ramos	California Emergency Services Act: notification systems	Current law authorizes a law enforcement agency to request the Department of the California Highway Patrol to activate a "Feather Alert," as defined, if specified criteria are satisfied with respect to an endangered indigenous person who has been reported missing under unexplained or suspicious circumstances. Current law requires the department, if it concurs that specified requirements are met, to activate a Feather Alert within the appropriate geographical area requested by the investigating law enforcement agency and to assist the agency by disseminating specified alert messages and signs. This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to enact subsequent legislation to improve the Feather Alert.

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8	AB 1932	Ward	California Statewide Housing Plan.	Current law requires the plan to incorporate specified segments, including a review of housing assistance policies, goals, and objectives affecting the homeless. This bill would recast that provision to require the plan to incorporate, in consultation with the Interagency Council on Homelessness and utilizing data from the Homeless Data Integration system, a review of housing assistance, policies, goals, and objectives affecting people experiencing homelessness.
9	AB 1933	Calderon	Wildfire risk models	On or before January 1, 2026, and on or before each January 1 thereafter, this bill would require the department to report to the Assembly Committee on Insurance and the Senate Committee on Insurance regarding wildfire risk models it regulates.
10	AB 1951	Fong	California Environmental Quality Act: exemptions: roadside wildfire prevention projects.	This bill would exempt from CEQA a project for wildfire prevention within 50 feet of either side of a roadway. Because a lead agency would be required to determine whether a project qualifies for this exemption, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

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11	AB 1984	Weber	Pupil health: extreme heat	Would state the intent of the Legislature to enact future legislation that would require school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools to develop and adopt guidelines to be followed during extreme heat to prevent heat-related illnesses.
12	AB 2014	Nguyen	Military Equipment: definitions	This bill would amend the definition of military equipment to instead require that the above-described vehicles are weaponized, as specified.
13	AB 2022	Addis	Mobilehome parks: emergency preparedness.	This bill would require that person who is responsible for emergencies concerning the operation and maintenance of the park to have knowledge of emergency procedures relative to access to park entrances and exits.

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14	AB 2075	Alvarez	Resident-Designated Support Persons Act	Current law, including the California Residential Care Facilities for the Elderly Act and the California Community Care Facilities Act, requires the licensure and regulation of certain residential health and care facilities and establishes specified rights for the residents of these licensees. Current law makes a violation of certain of these provisions or a willful or repeated violation of any rule or regulation promulgated under these provisions a crime. This bill would enact the Resident-Designated Support Persons Act. The act would provide a resident of a long-term care facility with the right to in-person, onsite access to a designated support person or a health care and social services provider during a public health emergency in which visitation rights of residents are curtailed by a state or local order, as specified. The act would provide how a resident may leave their long-term care facility on outings during a public health emergency. The act would require a long-term care facility, among other things, to provide safety protocols required of care staff, designated support persons, and other visitors to the residents, resident representatives, and residents' designated support persons orally and in writing.

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15	AB 2101	Rodriguez	Statewide strategic stockpile	Would require the State Department of Public Health, in coordination with the Office of Emergency Services and other state agencies, to establish a statewide strategic stockpile. The bill would require the department to establish guidelines for the procurement, management, and distribution of medicine, vaccines, and medical supplies, taking into account, among other things, the amount of each type of item required for a sustained health emergency. The bill would require the department to report annually to the Legislature, and others, the amount of items in the stockpile, the amount of items from the stockpile that have been used, and the amount of anticipated future usage.
16	AB 2469	Comte on Emg Mgt	Emergency Management Assistance Compact	Current law ratifies, approves, and sets forth the provisions of the Emergency Management Assistance Compact, an interstate agreement that provides for mutual assistance between states responding to emergencies and disasters. Under current law, the compact becomes inoperative on March 1, 2028, and is repealed as of January 1, 2029. This bill would delete the inoperative and repeal dates, thereby making the compact operative indefinitely.

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17	AB 2594	Comte on Emg Mgt	Emergency services: mutual aid: gap analysis	The Office of Emergency Services serves as the State Disaster Council for the purposes of the California Disaster and Civil Defense Master Mutual Aid Agreement. Current law authorizes state agencies to provide mutual aid, including personnel, equipment, and other available resources, to assist political subdivisions during a local emergency or in accordance with mutual aid agreements or at the direction of the Governor. This bill would require the office to prepare a gap analysis of the state's mutual aid systems on a biennial basis, beginning on January 1, 2025, as prescribed. The bill would require the office to prepare and submit to specified legislative committees a report on a gap analysis in accordance with the bill no later than February 1, 2025, and biennially thereafter by February 1 of subsequent odd-numbered years. This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an urgency statute.

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18	AB 2647	Low	State of Emergency: extensions	The Sales and Use Tax Law authorizes CDFTA to make the extension only during the first 12 months following the issuance of the state of emergency proclamation or the duration of the state of emergency, whichever is less. This bill would expand the authorization for the CDFTA to make the extension to the first 12 months and one day following the issuance of the state of emergency proclamation or the duration of the state of emergency, whichever is less.
19	AB 2660	Comte on Emg Mgt	Office of Emergency Services: federal share grant funding	Would require the Office of Emergency Services (OES), to the extent permitted by federal law, to provide to local operational areas and urban areas the maximum local share of federal grant funding administered by the office from specified federal grant programs relating to emergency management and homeland security.

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20	AB 2684	Bryan	Safety element: extreme heat	The Planning and Zoning Law requires the legislative body of a city or county to adopt a comprehensive, long-term general plan that includes various elements, including, among others, a safety element for the protection of the community from unreasonable risks associated with the effects of various geologic and seismic hazards, flooding, and wildland and urban fires. Current law requires the planning agency to review and, if necessary, revise the safety element upon each revision of its housing element or local hazard mitigation plan, but not less than once every 8 years, to identify new information relating to flood and fire hazards and climate adaptation and resiliency strategies applicable to the city or county that was not available during the previous revision of the safety element. This bill would require a city or county, upon the next revision of its local hazard mitigation plan on or after January 1, 2024, to review and update its safety element as necessary to address the hazard of extreme heat, as specified. The bill, after the initial revision of the safety element pursuant to these provisions, would require the planning agency to review and revise the safety element upon each revision of the housing element or local hazard mitigation plan to identify new information relating to extreme heat hazards and climate adaptation and

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21	AB 2715	Boerner	Ralph M. Brown Act: closed sessions	The Ralph M. Brown Act generally requires that all meetings of a legislative body of a local agency be open and public and that all persons be permitted to attend and participate. Current law authorizes a legislative body to hold a closed session on, among other things, matters posing a threat to the security of essential public services, as specified. This bill would additionally authorize a closed session to consider or evaluate matters related to cybersecurity, as specified, provided that any action taken on those matters is done in open session.

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22	AB 2727	Compte on Emg Mgt	Office of Emergency Services: Maritime firefighting mutual aid program	Would establish the Maritime Firefighting Mutual Aid Program within the Office of Emergency Services (OES) for the purpose of enhancing maritime firefighting capabilities of local fire departments. The bill, upon appropriation by the Legislature, would require OES to conduct an all-risk maritime response capabilities assessment, as specified, and acquire and provide fire boats to local fire departments, as specified, and would require the local fire departments to utilize the fire boats to enhance local, regional, and mutual aid response capabilities. By requiring local fire departments to utilize fire boats, as provided, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would also establish the Maritime Firefighting Mutual Aid Fund for purposes of the program.

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23	AB 2742	Sanchez	Emergency Vehicles: penalties	Would prohibit a person driving a vehicle upon a highway or a pedestrian from willfully obstructing a highway, including in the course of a protest, in any manner that interferes with the ability of an authorized emergency vehicle to pass and would make a violation of this provision punishable by specified fines. By creating a new crime, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

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24	AB 2765	Pellerin	Telecommunications services: backup electricity: verification	Current law requires the Public Utilities Commission, in consultation with the Office of Emergency Services, to develop and implement backup electricity rules to require providers of telecommunications service, as defined, to submit resiliency plans to maintain backup electricity for their telecommunications infrastructure sufficient to maintain telecommunications service for at least 72 hours, except as authorized. Current law requires the commission, in developing and implementing those rules, to consider best practices, the feasibility of the rules, and stakeholder input. This bill would require the commission, as part of a new or existing proceeding, to develop and implement rules to conduct random annual facility checks to verify that providers of telecommunications service are in compliance with those backup electricity rules. The bill would require that these rules annually require at least 12 random facility checks throughout the state that are equitably distributed by region and among providers of telecommunications service.

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25	AB 2776	Comte on Emg Mgt	State Government: major federal disasters: funding priority	This bill would authorize the OES, the OPR, and the council to prioritize infrastructure and housing recovery projects in communities that suffered a loss in population and businesses due to a major federal disaster and have unmet recovery needs as a result of a major federal disaster under specified programs, including, among others, the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program and the federal Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities program. The bill would require also authorize the OES, the- OPR, and the council to prioritize funding to communities recovering from major federal disasters under those same specified programs

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26	AB 2816	Gipson	School safety: School mapping data grant program	Current law provides that it is the intent of the Legislature that all public schools, in kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, operated by school districts, in cooperation with specified entities and individuals, develop a comprehensive school safety plan, as provided. Current law provides that school districts and county offices of education are responsible for the overall development of a comprehensive school safety plan for each of its schools, as provided. This bill, upon appropriation by the Legislature, would establish the School Mapping Data Grant Program under the administration of the Office of Emergency Services to provide one-time grants to participating school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools to enter into contracts with qualified vendors providing school mapping data, as provided, for purposes of assisting public safety agencies in efficiently responding to on-campus emergencies at schools.

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27	AB 2858	Dahle	California Emergency Services Act: State Emergency Plan	require state to update SEP every 4 yrs. Under existing law, the California Emergency Services Act, the State Emergency Plan is the official document approved by the Governor that describes the principles and methods to be applied in carrying out emergency operations or rendering mutual aid during emergencies, and includes elements addressing continuity of government, the emergency services of governmental agencies, mobilization of resources, mutual aid, and public information. Existing law makes the State Emergency Plan effective in each political subdivision of the state, and requires the governing body of each political subdivision to take necessary actions to carry out its provisions. Existing law requires the Governor to coordinate the State Emergency Plan and those programs necessary for the mitigation of the effects of an emergency in this state and to coordinate the preparation of plans and programs for the mitigation of the effects of an emergency by the political subdivisions of this state, which are to be integrated into and coordinated with the State Emergency Plan and the plans and programs of the federal government and of other states to the maximum possible extent. This bill would require the Office of Emergency Services to update the State Emergency Plan every 4 years after the update

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28	AB 3020	Reyes	2-1-1 Infrastructure Act	Pursuant to authority delegated by the Federal Communications Commission to state regulatory bodies and its existing statutory authority, the Public Utilities Commission has established procedures for implementing 2-1-1 dialing in California to connect people to social services and aid in times of disaster. Current law, until January 1, 2023, authorized the commission, if it determined that doing so was an appropriate use of funds collected from ratepayers, to expend up to \$1,500,000 from the California Teleconnect Fund Administrative Committee Fund to help close 2-1-1 service gaps in counties lacking access to disaster preparedness, response, and recovery information and referral services, where technically feasible, through available 2-1-1 service. Current law establishes the Office of Planning and Research (OPR) within the Governor's office to provide long-range planning and research and to serve as the comprehensive state planning agency. This bill would, upon appropriation, require the OPR to establish and convene the 2-1-1 Strategic Council. The bill would require the council to be composed of specified members, including directors of specified state agencies or their

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29	AB 3045	Ta	Disaster cleanup	The California Disaster Assistance Act requires the Director of Emergency Services to adopt regulations, as necessary, to govern the administration of a disaster assistance program that includes specific project eligibility requirements, a procedure for local governments to request the implementation of programs, and a method for evaluating these requests by the Office of Emergency Services. This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to enact subsequent legislation that would allow cities to apply for funds from the Office of Emergency Services without having to go through the county process.
30	AB 3075	Nguyen	Local government; grant programs: technical assistance	Current law establishes various grant programs that are available to, or implemented by, local governments, including a building code enforcement incentive program, the Natural Disaster Emergency Shelter Program, and the Homeless Emergency Aid program. This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to provide additional technical assistance to local government accessing state grant programs.

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31	AB 3090	Maienschein	Drinking water standards: noncompliance: notification	Current law requires a person operating a public water system to notify the State Water Resources Control Board and users of the public water system, in the manner prescribed by the board, when any primary drinking water standard specified in the board's regulations is not complied with, when a monitoring requirement specified in the board's regulations is not performed, or when a water purveyor fails to comply with the conditions of any variance or exemption. Current law authorizes and encourages the public water system to provide notice through foreign language media in addition to nonwritten notification provided for in the public water system's emergency notification plan. This bill would further authorize and encourage public water systems to provide notification through public safety communications technology, including the federal Wireless Emergency Alert system, that communicates with groups in the affected geographic area.

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32	AB 3150	Quirk-Silva	Fire Safety: fire hazard severity zonesL defensible space: state fire marshal	Current law requires the State Fire Marshal to identify areas in the state as moderate, high, and very high fire hazard severity zones based on consistent statewide criteria and based on the severity of fire hazard that is expected to prevail in those areas. Current law requires a local agency, within 30 days after receiving a transmittal from the State Fire Marshal that identifies those fire hazard severity zones, to make the information available for public review and comment. This bill would require the State Fire Marshal to provide an opportunity for the public to review and comment on the fire hazard severity zone maps before the State Fire Marshal submits them to the local agency.

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33	ACA 2	Alanis	Water Resiliency Act of 2024	The California Constitution declares that the general welfare requires that the water resources of the state be put to beneficial use to the fullest extent of which they are capable, and that the right to the use of water does not extend to the waste or unreasonable use, method of use, or method of diversion of water. This measure would require the Treasurer to annually transfer an amount equal to 1.5% of all state revenues from the General Fund to the California Water Resiliency Trust Fund, which the measure would create. The measure would continuously appropriate moneys in the fund to the California Water Commission for its actual costs of implementing these provisions and for specified water infrastructure projects. The measure would require the California State Auditor to annually conduct a programmatic review and an audit of expenditures from the California Water Resiliency Trust Fund and to report those findings, as specified. The measure would authorize a project funded pursuant to these provisions to elect to be subject to a streamlined review pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act, as specified. The measure would provide that its provisions are severable and would require the

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34	SB 571	Allen	Fire safety regulations: development projects: ingress and egress route standards	Current law requires the State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection to adopt regulations implementing minimum fire safety standards, as provided. This bill would require the state board, on or before January 1, 2027, to create, and provide to the Legislature, a report relating to standards for ingress and egress routes in new development, as provided. The bill would require the state board to do certain things when creating the report, including provide opportunities for input from the public, as specified. The bill would prohibit the state board from adopting any regulations incorporating the standards described in the report until at least 6 months after completing that report.
